

Our visit for a few days to the World Council of Churches Assembly in Canberra during February was both exciting and inspiring. Exciting because I met again 2 friends from Holland and Scotland whom I had not seen since 1971 in Bossey.



Food for Thought

For three seasons now I have had the same malnourished Ethiopian child dying in my lounge room. My donations do not seem to have helped, and my guilt, arising from living in my basic opulence, in contrast to what I see on my TV screen, becomes uncomfortable each time. I feel hopeless and helpless. But also angry.

The relief systems of helping agencies have major goals for their clients, whether they be individuals, groups or nations. These are to develop self reliance and self determination based on the resources of that client. The initial goal is usually help in removing dependency, for no client can reach any level of maturity by leaning on someone else, no matter how well meaning that someone else may be, or appears to be.

Autumn Reflection

I was standing warmly musing in the autumn sunshine as my eyes took in the calm blue bay and the trim beach at Balmoral, when I was startled by a metallic crash alongside me. "Great day" sounded in my ear. I turned to find a bus driver who had just plonked his cash box on the sandstone promenade wall.

"It is.... that water looks great for a swim this beach has so many happy memories for Sydney families."

"Is this where someone tried to shoot the Duke of Edinburgh?"

"No, it was just around that headland on the other shore at Clontarf. But what was interesting here was an open air theatre for people to watch the second coming of Christ through the Heads."

"I am not sure about the first coming," he said.

Well ... from there on we talked about people's gullibility, life, death, shark nets, religion, water tanks and families, in a flowing, but somehow disjointed way, as we picked up on each other's thoughts. Both gazing at the harbour scene and not really looking at the other. It was a short friendly encounter so fittingly made possible by a glorious setting and a sudden sense of a peaceful companion.

"Oh well ... back to work," he said, picking up his cash box and returning to his bus.

"I guess so. See ya." I stood there alone but felt that we had both shared something very human.

In thinking about the problems of world hunger, the American authors, Frances Moore Lappe and Joseph Collins, in their book "World Hunger - 10 Myths", pursue these thoughts. They point out that hunger in a country is not as the result of scarce resources of food, of too many people or lack of desire for change. It is because there is a system of control of resources in which the decision makers are minimal and self seeking. The U.S. aid given goes into that system of control and so increases the power in the hands of that special few. This lessens the power of the people and blocks hopes for change.

This book backs up these conclusions with an impressive list of resource material.

Did you know that:

- 250,000 children die every week in the Third World due to malnutrition, poor hygiene, dirty water and disease.
- The cost of ensuring a safe water supply for all people is estimated at \$3 - 4 billion per year.
- The world spends \$600 billion on armaments per year.



In Australia:

- An estimated 2.5 million Australians live below the poverty line.
- 10% of the population owns more than 60% of the wealth.
- Up to 40,000 people are homeless and a further 60,000 people lack secure housing.

A tragic wave of human misery has crossed our screens for many months. We were told that peace was returning to the Gulf.

But with its supposed return comes the awareness of the legacy of human displacement; misery and hunger.

Whilst irreparable long term
damage to species and organisms
has left a void.

Alongside these appalling events, poverty stricken Bangladesh faces the aftermath of devastating floods.

Food shipments are being rushed to aid African countries set to face a severe famine. Its magnitude like that of the Geldorf Appeal famine. Closer to home unemployment has seen an increase in poverty.

A kind of "care fatigue" or apathy may lead us to look at our own economic problems (hardly comparable) and maybe shut down our response to both situations.

Or we may ask what can one person really do? What does it really matter if I don't get involved?

Aligning ourselves with the poor and marginalised can release that strong and Christlike vision to bring change, healing and hope.

Soap Savers Unite (or uniting soap savers)

Soap savers, yes soap savers are coming back into vogue.

Attending a term of home ecology I was given an audit sheet to monitor the chemicals and additives used in my home.

A startling exercise. Reading all the labels can be hazardous to the conscience!! So beware!!

I've pondered my own contribution to saving the environment for many years. My new knowledge of the toxic waste we generate has lead me to further change.

A vigorous return to string bags suds saving and simpler cleaning products has ensued.

Living and working in Fijl on a mission stipend lead us to soap savers, string saving and home vegetable gardening. Our Indian neighbours used a jam tin pierced with holes for a soap saver. The "chook yard" at the childrens' home on our compound provided a ready use for used vegetable scraps. Now I've started a compost bin. A small step.

Larger steps are being taken by our local council. However, the latest Northern Herald reports only 27% of residential waste as being recycled by 83% of residents. Council policy they say provides for 50%. They urge a more thorough sorting of waste. Something into which we may all put renewed energy.

Within our parish notably Jo Melville collects used foil containers as a parish fund raiser.

Whilst a dedicated crew of workers collects and trims used postage stamps for the Stamp Committee of Synod.
